Inferences:

Document B

Facts:

The poor have brought power in Athens.

Poor should be allowed to speak in Athens.

Inferences:

Athenians value the poor and everyday man.

The rich hasn't helped grow the city-state.

Document C

Facts:

Romans gave citizenship in measured amounts.

Citizenship in Athens was all equal.

Inferences:

Rome's enemies may have been more willing to obey or be conquered.

Romans looked down on Athenians.

Document D

Facts:

Athenians didn't punish wrong-doing, but lowered person's position.

Exile in Athens if person has too much power.

Roman citizens separated by class.

Demotion for those who don't meet standards.

Inferences:

Athenians balanced government power.

People may not have wanted citizenship in Athens
